National Park Service Programs in the Marin Headlands!

BATTERY TOWNSLEY OPEN HOUSE

12/4, 2/5 (12PM–4PM)

Open the first Sunday of each month with the exception of January. Battery Townsley at Fort Cronkhite was San Francisco's most extensive—and most secret—World War II military fortification. From 1940 to 1948, it mounted two massive battleship guns and housed more than 100 soldiers in an extensive network of underground tunnels; during the Cold War, it was used as an underground research facility.

Long closed to public access, Battery Townsley has been refurbished and the public is invited to visit and explore this labyrinthine fortification. Battery Townsley is reached via a moderately strenuous hike up the Coastal Trail approximately half-mile north of the Rodeo Beach parking lot. For further assistance to the site, call **331-1540**.

NIKE MISSILE SITE OPEN HOUSE

12/3, 1/7, 2/4 (12:30PM–3:30PM)

Open the first Saturday of each month, and Wednesday, Thursday and Friday afternoons. Unique in the National Park Service, this restored Cold War anti-aircraft missile site has intriguing stories to tell. Leashed pets are welcome. For up-dated visiting hours or tours, phone **331-1453**. Buildings above ground are wheelchair accessible. Visit the Nike Missile website at www.nps.gov/nike-missile-site.htm.

HISTORIC FORT BAKER TOUR

1/7, 2/11 (1PM–2PM)

Come visit Fort Baker's historic Colonial Revival buildings and learn how this 1905 army post represented a new and improved standard of living for the officers and soldiers stationed here. Meet architectural historian Kristin Baron at the Cavallo Point reception building, 601 Murray Circle. This easy, 1-mile walk has one slightly steep hill climb. Program limited to 20 people; heavy rain cancels. For reservations and parking information, call **331-1540**.

FORT BAKER REVEALED: A NATURE AND HISTORY WALKING TOUR

2/25 (1PM–3PM)

Learn about nature and history at Fort Baker on a moderate 2-mile walk. Bring a camera and wear comfortable shoes and warm layers. Meet ranger Will Elder at the kiosk in front of the Bay Area Discovery Museum, at the corner of Center Road and New Breitung Road, Fort Baker. BEGINNING BIRDING

12/18, 1/15, 2/12 (9:30AM–11:30AM)

Just like people, there are “snowbirds” in the avian world and the Marin Headlands is one of the spots to which they flock during winter. Join docent Jane Haley on an easy walk to discover our winter residents and visitors. Meet at Marin Headlands Visitor Center. Bring field guide and binoculars. Appropriate for ages 8 and older. LIGHTHOUSES OF THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY

12/4, 2/5 (11AM–12PM)

Following the discovery of gold in 1848, the Bay Area experienced one of the most explosive population expansions in modern history. During the latter half of that century, the men and women of the lighthouse service, aided by their light and fog signals, directed hundreds of ships to safe passage through the Golden Gate and often provided life-saving services. These services played a critical role in the growth of a new state. Join docent Warren Riley for an illustrated talk inside the Marin Headlands Visitor Center. For reservations, phone **331-1540**.

COASTAL DEFENSES OF THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY

12/4, 2/5 (1PM–2PM)

The Coastal Defenses of San Francisco Bay have played an important part in major historical events. These events include the end of the Mexican American war, the Gold Rush, California statehood, the Civil War, WWI, and WWII. Each event added the desire for improved coastal defense capabilities. Join docent Warren Riley for an illustrated presentation of the Coastal Defenses of San Francisco Bay - 1850 to 1950. We will be discussing the advancements and thinking behind the many attempts to provide this critical area with the best and most advanced defenses of the day. For reservations, phone **331-1540**.

Point Bonita will soon have a new structure. Our one of a kind suspension bridge from 1955 will be replaced. Work on the new bridge began in September 2011 and by spring of 2012 we will have a new suspension bridge that will look identical to our current bridge. Sausalito Village

Sausalito Village, an idea whose time has come, arrived at our shores in October 2010 and has been growing exponentially ever since. One of many Villages which have sprung up across the United States in the past ten years, it is modeled on Boston's Beacon Hill Village which launched in 2001 when a group of Beacon Hill residents, determined to remain in their homes as they aged, banded together to create the kinds of support systems they would need to accomplish their goal.

If you are 60+ years of age and planning to stay in your home in Sausalito as you grow older, you might consider enjoying the benefits of membership in Sausalito Village. Under the auspices of its umbrella organization, Marin Village, the key element of membership is a single telephone number that you can call for referrals to service providers. Some services are provided by volunteers and others are available for a fee, often discounted, from thoroughly vetted third parties. Such services might include transportation to the Airporter, shopping, and doctors' appointments; small household repairs; computer training and support; referrals to qualified health care workers; respite and support for caregivers.

In addition to the service hotline, membership opens up the opportunity to become part of a vibrant community of people who share in many social, cultural, and recreational events. During the winter of 2010-11, SV members attended the Marin Symphony, the Fisher Exhibit of Photography in San Francisco, and a presentation at the studio of the late Sausalito artist, Walter Kuhlman. They also participated in classes in Yoga, flower arranging, and memoir writing. Our "neighbors helping neighbors" volunteer program invites you to participate in an active volunteer corps already making a difference in

our community.

Asphalt and rustic fencing were removed from a section of the Main Trail in Muir Woods last fall. A new, fully accessible boardwalk is being built in its place.

Experience Muir Woods in Winter on Newly Upgraded Trails

Continuing in the tradition of conservation at Muir Woods, the Main Trail between the Cross Cut and Pinchot Tree was closed for construction last fall. The asphalt and rustic fencing were removed and a new boardwalk will be built along the former alignment to the Pinchot Tree area.

The trail section leading to the Pinchot Tree is a particularly beautiful introduction to an old growth redwood forest. As visitors walk beside Redwood Creek, the new boardwalk will expand into a deck near a gnarled, old, California big leaf maple. Here, visitors seem to take their first cleansing breath of fragrant bay trees. Nearby, a fire-scarred ancestral tree is surrounded by its offspring in a family circle. Further along the boardwalk, redwood boughs part overhead to reveal the canopy of giant trees, some twenty stories above the forest floor. The grove expands into a prehistoric scene of fire-scarred trees, a jagged snag and fallen tree, and an ancient nurse log. Slanting light between the redwoods brings to mind the story of early conservationists depicted in vintage photographs on a large wayside sign. If not for William Kent, Gifford Pinchot, and Theodore Roosevelt, the redwood forest might have been lost forever.

The new boardwalk will be made of sustainably-harvested, second-growth redwood. When the section re-opens after January 2012, visitors will walk on a dry, fully accessible path above the forest floor and have un-obstructed views of the redwood trees. With a smaller footprint, the boardwalk will proper drainage in winter and the soil beneath to rejuvenate. Best of all, the boardwalk will better protect the redwood roots from compaction. The work is funded through franchise fees from the Muir Woods Trading Company Gift Shop and Café.

In addition, the NPS trail crew completed work on the Hillside

Trail last fall. The historic trail was closed for several months after a large redwood tree and later a bay tree fell across the trail after winter storms. The trail closure may be a factor in the rich array of clintonia, trillium, ferns and fungi. The upcoming winter promises to be a good year for wildflower and fungi displays. As John Muir said, "Walk the Sequoia woods at any time of the year and you will say they are the most beautiful and majestic on earth." When viewed from the new boardwalk, we heartily agree.

A NEW LOOK PLANNED FOR THE LIBRARY

Enormous changes in technology and media since the 1975 remodel have prompted us to re-evaluate the way this space is used. The library has been bursting at the seams trying to maintain a worthy collection, provide traditional services, and shoehorn all new media into existing space.

To consider how improvements might be made, the Sausalito Library Foundation funded the hiring of a library planning and interior design firm to examine our library's physical space, assess its ability to serve the community, identify ways to more effectively use the existing space, and recommend plans for the future. Planning for a new or expanded library is a long-term proposition. We're not there yet. But the Foundation will lend its support to the Library Board of Trustees and match funds with the library's capital improvements fund to move ahead, as an interim strategy, with short-term improvements in the library's current envelope of space. We look forward to working with the newly hired City Librarian and the Trustees on the timing of this remodel. Our goal is to make sure that our beloved library remains relevant, accessible and comfortable. The best is yet to come.

LIBRARY LAPTOP LENDING PROGRAM

MUSEUM PASSES

Keeping Sausalito History Alive

In July, the Historical Society was pleased to participate in welcoming ceremonies for the Mayor of Sausalito's Chilean sister city, Viña del Mar. Mayor Reginato and her sizable delegation closely examined our City Hall exhibit of artifacts from this 51-year relationship. (That exhibit is still on display on the main floor opposite the City Administrative offices). Later, we presented the Mayor with a copy of Jack Tracy's "Moments in Time" as a memento of her visit. Events

Perhaps it was the full moon, or the main attraction, that filled the Seahorse Caffe in September for "The Names Behind the No Name Bar, Part II," featuring Neil Davis, proprietor of the legendary waterfront saloon during its heyday from 1959-1973. This was a return engagement for Davis, who packed a meeting room at City Hall last January, sharing memories of well-known No Name characters. Auctioneer D.J. Puffert also offered donated prizes including gift certificates from Poggio, Horizons, and Scoma's as well as a 15,000 mile service from Toyota Marin and yoga lessons with massage from Sausalito Yoga. Dave Benoit, unofficial diver of the Historical Society, also donated some sunken treasures he's salvaged from the bottom of the Bay. This fundraiser netted about \$2,000 to help fund the Society's programs (details below).

Thirty SHS members and guests were treated to a preview of the annual Sausalito Classic Car Show with a reception at Vijay Mallya's Sausalito Car Collection on October 1.

The following month, architectural historian Laura Ackley discussed the people of San Francisco's 1915 Panama Pacific International Exposition—the world's fair that gave Sausalito those distinctive elephants in Viña del Mar Plaza. This event was held at Wellington's Wine Bar.

In December, the Historical Society will salute the Centennial celebration of the Sausalito Woman's Club with a new exhibit of art and artifacts from the era around 1912. Look for an announcement of the actual opening date.

At 4pm on Thursday, December 15, lutenist Eric Kjørlién plays music of the renaissance courts, churches and castles, at the Society's Ice House historic exhibit and visitors center, 780 Bridgeway. This holiday treat will be free to the public. The Ice House also features books, greeting cards, videos, posters, and note cards with stunning photographs of Sausalito and particularly appealing shots of harbor seals and sea lions off our waterfront. The Ice House is open Tuesday through Sunday from 11:30 am to 4pm.

On Thursday, January 26, SHS docent Steefenie Wicks, a founding member and resident photographer for the Galilee Harbor Community, will share her images and speak about the history of the harbor in Sausalito Council Chambers, from 5-7 pm. Refreshments will be served. This event will be free for members, \$10 for non-members.

Schools Program

The Society continues to reach out to students from Bayside School and Willow Creek Academy, under the leadership of SHS board members Susan Frank and Bob Woodrum. Third graders learned about and visited some of Sausalito's historic buildings in November. Next spring, classroom presentations and field trips will focus on noteworthy Sausalitans from 100 years ago, and on the historic Marinship area. Each program involves approximately 40-50 students, over a dozen docents, numerous parents, school administrators and local businesses.

The Historical Society contributes a weekly history column to the MarinScope, and some of the most recent columns have been posted on our website: www.sausalitohistoricalsociety.com. The site also features links to other local historical organizations, and to the Sausalito News, which is searchable online from 1885-1923.

With the help of memberships and an active docent program, the Society—a volunteer, non-profit organization—maintains the Phil Frank Research Room and Exhibit Room at 420 Litho Street, as well as the Ice House at 780 Bridgeway.

The Society's mission is to collect and preserve art, artifacts, photographs and printed materials that document Sausalito's history, and the public is invited to visit from 11am to 1pm each Wednesday and Saturday. We are continuing to upgrade the Society's storage facilities, thanks to generous donations from SHS members.

The SHS also provides access to the collections for public and academic research; and presents outreach programs to inspire local interest in Sausalito's history and to educate the visiting public and enrich the community.

Becoming Julia Morgan

THE AWARD-WINNING PLAY BY BELINDA TAYLOR AND DIRECTED BY BARBARA OLIVER. THREE DAYS ONLY, SAUSALITO WOMAN'S CLUB. JANUARY 13, 14, 15, 2012

Architect Julia Morgan, greatly admired in the Bay Area, remains surprisingly little known elsewhere. And those who do know of her are curious about her private side. She remains elusive, even to her most ardent admirers. Berkeley playwright Belinda Taylor addresses this conundrum in *Becoming Julia Morgan*, a new play exploring this pioneering woman architect's determination to stay out of the limelight—"I'm not one of those talking architects!"—and the equal determination of one young San Francisco Examiner reporter to persuade her to give up her secrets.

This award-winning production will have a 3-day run at the Morgan-designed Sausalito Woman's Club January 13, 14 and 15, 2012. Noted Berkeley director Barbara Oliver helms the ensemble cast, with Janis Stevens (member Actors Equity Assoc.) reprising her award-winning role as Julia Morgan, which earned her a best actress "Elly" from the Sacramento Area Regional Theatre Association (SARTA) when the play had its debut in 2006 at California Stage. The production also garnered playwright Taylor an Elly award for best new script. Last year's Berkeley City Club production received five nominations and won a Best Ensemble from the Bay Area Theatre Critics Circle.

Woven with wit, fast-paced and moving, *Becoming Julia Morgan* played to sold-out houses and won rave reviews in both Berkeley and Sacramento.

Becoming Julia Morgan follows the life of Julia Morgan over a six-year period, 1931 to 1937, as she works on San Simeon, runs a busy San Francisco office with a large staff, and surmounts a medical crisis and her fears that she may have been too successful at keeping a low profile. There are flashbacks to her student days at UC Berkeley and in Paris, and a flash forward to today.

The ensemble cast undertakes multiple roles: Dave Garrett as the larger than life newspaper tycoon Randolph Hearst, the Roman God Janus and beloved architect Bernard Maybeck; Sally Clawson as actress Marion Davies, Phoebe Hearst, and the Roman Goddess, Vesta; Ben Euphrat as Julia's brother Avery, fictional reporter Jerry Mac, and Charlie Chaplin.

Julia Morgan was born in 1872 (just seven years after the end of the Civil War), growing up in a large family in the burgeoning city of Oakland during the final decades of the Victorian era. A tiny woman with a big ambition—to become an architect when there were virtually no female role models to show the way—Morgan overcame the social barriers of her day to become California's first licensed woman architect. But first she had to battle her way into a centuries-old exclusive male bastion, the world famous School of Architecture at L'Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Paris. She used her design talent, her ability to listen to and integrate her clients' needs, and her extraordinary engineering skill to design and construct more than 700 buildings in her lifetime, including the magnificent Hearst Castle.

In researching the play, Taylor discovered Julia Morgan does not give up her secrets easily. She was devoutly private. Taylor, herself a journalist for many years at the Oakland Tribune (and prior to that at the Novato Advance), identified with the fictional reporter in her play: "Jerry's efforts to get at the essential Julia Morgan — he wanted to write a book, I wanted to write a play — were constantly frustrated. But her fear that she had been too successful at staying out of the limelight motivates her to open up to Jerry, and in writing these scenes, I felt her opening up to me."

A TENACIOUS WILL TO SUCCEED IN A MAN'S WORLD

Becoming Julia Morgan shines a light on Morgan's bravery, fears, eccentricities, generosity and dedication to craftsmanship, illuminating a tenacious will to succeed in a man's world. Her success and the grace with which she lived her life serve to inspire us today, especially women and girls. The proof of her "confounding ability to conjure up beauty" is that we yearn to experience her buildings, be inside them, absorb the exciting visual elements and the harmony that are hallmarks of her artistry. Adds Taylor, "And we are eternally curious about this Sphinx-like genius."

A Living History Foundation grant of \$1,000 underwrote the playwright's multiple trips to the special Julia Morgan Collection at the Kennedy Library at Cal State Poly where hundreds of architectural drawings, photos and letters are kept in meticulous files that could only be handled wearing white cotton gloves. The Julia Morgan archives at UC Berkeley also proved a rich vein, as did published books, including Sara Holmes Boutelle's excellent *Julia Morgan, Architect*.

A short time ago, a handsome young man (who looked vaguely familiar) came into our school offices and asked if he could visit with several teachers. He was very well spoken, polite and articulate. Imagine the rejoicing when we realized that he, now a senior in high school, was one of our students who left Willow Creek at the end of 5th grade because his family was moving out of the area. Let me share some history—he came to Willow Creek in 3rd grade, speaking not a word of English, though very literate in Spanish. He spent three years with us, absorbing our curriculum, our school culture and exiting with an excellent control of what, for him, is a second language.

One of Willow Creek's goals has to imbue students with an appreciation of the greater environment and we have woven environmental education into many of our other subjects. As we met with this young man, we learned that one of his major high school projects has been the study of water and its importance in supporting life. He, with some of his student colleagues, has organized a program where they go to all of the elementary schools in his current school district to teach kindergarten through 3rd grade students the importance of taking care of our water sources. In addition, they have initiated a 300-mile bicycle ride to raise money to provide clean drinking water for children in third world countries.

Just a few weeks ago, we welcomed another one of our graduates as a twice a week volunteer in our younger classrooms. Watching

her skillfully work with primary age children was a delight. Her understanding of their skills and abilities was demonstrated as she kept them all engaged in an active playground activity. She chose to come back to Willow Creek to fulfill a volunteer requirement in her high school program—and it is clear that she selected a place where her talents could shine.

And then there is the high school junior who came one day to visit, and as she stood clutching one of the largest, thickest text books I have ever seen, we had a conversation about her hopes and dreams to be a computer scientist. Not only was I pleased to learn a young lady was excited about science and technology, I was really impressed that the title of that text was Calculus. She admitted that the class was challenging, but that she really, really enjoyed it.

These three young adults are an important part of why the work we do at Willow Creek is so very important. Students are often here for nine years (from Kindergarten through eighth grade) and those years are so critical to their social, emotional, academic and physical growth and maturity. For all of us in education, it is a real honor to touch the future in this way.

City of Sausalito Housing Element Update Preparation

The City of Sausalito is preparing an update of its Housing Element in accordance with State law. The Housing Element is one of seven state-mandated chapters in a city's General Plan. The State requires that with the Housing Element update the City address a Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA), which establishes the number of new housing units needed by various income groups (from very low to upper income) in each California jurisdiction. The RHNA for the City of Sausalito was established at 372 units for the two planning periods of 1999-2006 and 2007-2014. The Housing Element describes various programs the City will continue or establish to address its regional housing need. Cities are not required to actually build the housing—rather, they must demonstrate to the State that the opportunity to build the housing has been created.

The Housing Element Task Force has been meeting to discuss ways in which the City can meet the State requirements. Options identified include:

- Encouraging new Accessory Dwelling Units;
- Legalizing existing Accessory Dwelling Units;
- Demonstrating that liveaboards are housing units;
- Creating Affordable Housing Overlay Zones;
- Rezoning specific sites to accommodate housing.

Why Did My Vehicle Get Towed by the Sausalito Police Department? The Facts and Answers to Vehicle Tows and Impounds – Part One

Most citizens who have the unfortunate experience of having their vehicle towed rarely understand why. Even more confusing is the process that owners have to go through to reclaim their vehicle. The following article will help to explain why a vehicle may be towed, but more importantly, it will help make the process of reclaiming a towed vehicle easier.

The difference between towed/stored and towed/impounded is not just a matter of semantics. There is a distinct difference between a vehicle that has been towed/stored versus a vehicle that has been towed/impounded. A vehicle that has been towed/stored may be immediately released without conditions. A vehicle that has been towed/impounded may not be released until the registered owner has complied with correcting the reasons the vehicle was towed/impounded. Some examples will help.

REASONS FOR TOWED/STORED OR TOWED/IMPOUNDED VEHICLES

The most important information to know about vehicle tows is how to avoid the situation altogether. There are more than twenty reasons why a vehicle may be stored or impounded but this article will explain the four most common reasons: Multiple unpaid parking citations, expired registration, blocking a driveway, and parked in one place for over 72 hours.

The first reason for a vehicle impound, and the easiest to explain, is due to unpaid parking citations. If a vehicle is parked on a public street and has five or more unpaid parking citations, it is subject to impound. These citations do not have to be issued from only one agency and they do not include toll violations. To recover your vehicle, you must pay the outstanding parking citations at the DMV and bring the proof of payment to the police department.

The next reason for an impounded vehicle is expired registration. The California Vehicle Code, in section 22651(o), states that a vehicle is subject to impound if it has expired registration in excess of 6 months. Expired registration is any incomplete vehicle registration which includes: Paying your registration fee but not completing the DMV required smog check, listing your vehicle as non-operational with the DMV and then parking it on a public roadway, and paying your DMV registration fee but not receiving and displaying the current license plate sticker/tab. Again, if you fail to complete the vehicle registration in 6 months, your vehicle is subject to impound. To recover your vehicle in this situation, you must present current proof of registration from the DMV to the police department that impounded your vehicle. This does not include a red temporary registration form or tabs. The DMV printout showing current registration is required.

Blocking a driveway is a reason a vehicle may be towed and stored. This situation is unlike the other two in that officers do not look for this violation. Instead, this is a complaint based tow and storage.



This occurs when a citizen calls in to report that their driveway is either partially or completely blocked by a vehicle. When officers are dispatched to these types of calls, their first response is to try not to tow the vehicle. If the owner of the residence can safely utilize their driveway, a citation may be issued instead of doing a tow and store. If the driveway is completely blocked, the officer makes every attempt to locate the driver of the vehicle using the address and name on the registration of the vehicle. Only after all avenues have been exhausted does an officer tow and store a vehicle that is blocking a driveway.

The last most common reason for a vehicle tow and storage is when a vehicle is parked in one place for over 72 hours. This is also a complaint based violation. It is very rare for a parking enforcement officer or police officer to locate a vehicle and start the process for a 72 hour violation on their own. That does not mean that it cannot be initiated by a member of the police department, simply that it is not a common occurrence. To start the process for a 72 hour violation, a vehicle must come to the attention of the police department, usually from a phone call by a neighbor or business owner. When this occurs, the vehicle is marked either with chalk on the tire or some other method to start the 72 hour period. A bright orange sticker may also be affixed to the window of the vehicle making the owner aware of the violation and possible tow. The warning sticker is not required by law for a 72 hour violation. It is a courtesy from the police department to affix this sticker to warn the registered owner to move the vehicle before it is towed. If the vehicle hasn't moved in 72 hours after the initial marking by the police department, it will be towed and stored. At the officer's discretion, the vehicle may also receive a citation for the violation at this time.

VEHICLE RELEASES

If your vehicle does get towed/stored or towed/impounded, there are several steps that must be completed to get it back. And, since the tow company charges the vehicle owner by the day for vehicle storage, it is best if these steps are completed quickly rather than waiting for the written notice of vehicle storage or impound sent by the police department via the post office. In compliance with State law, the written notice mailed to the legal and registered owner of the towed vehicle contains the explanation of the owner's right to a post-storage hearing. Be sure to read the notice or look up California Vehicle Code section 22852.

The first step is to find out why your vehicle was towed. Call the police department so you will know if you need to go to the DMV for paperwork before going to the PD or if you need to bring a licensed driver with you. Always bring a valid driver's license (or photo ID if you don't have a license) for identification purposes. Next, come to the police department to receive your vehicle release form which will cost \$125 in cash or credit card. The tow yard will not release a police stored or impounded vehicle without it. Last, take the vehicle release form to the tow yard to get your vehicle. The fees that the tow yard charges are not related to the police department. They charge a one-time fee for the tow in addition to daily storage fees.

Our next article, Part Two, will contain information regarding the 30 day impound process for vehicles driven by unlicensed drivers or those drivers whose driving privileges were suspended or revoked by a court of law.




