### Sausalito Village

Sausalito Village provides practical assistance, social connections, and resources for seniors who wish to remain in their Sausalito homes and connected to their community. Sausalito Village is operated by an all-volunteer steering committee under the fiscal sponsorship of Community Initiatives, a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization that provides fiscal sponsorships for community projects throughout the San Francisco Bay Area (and not affiliated with Marin Villages).

A key element of membership in Sausalito Village is a telephone number—**332-3325**—that members can call to request assistance and referrals to the types of services and support they require. Most of our referrals are to a dedicated team of more than 50 volunteers, all of whom have been thoroughly vetted and passed a background check. These volunteers provide services such as transportation to the Airporter, shopping, and doctor's appointments, help with small household repairs, computer training and assistance, friendly visits to homebound members, and respite and support for caregivers. At the request of a member, trained volunteers will do a safety assessment of the member's home, make recommendations for modifications that can be taken to reduce risks, and refer the member to volunteer and/or paid service providers to accomplish these modifications. A health care advocacy group, consisting of volunteers with experience in some area of the health care field, will assist members in navigating their way through the increasingly complicated health care system to ensure that their needs are identified and appropriately addressed.

When the type of assistance needed by a member exceeds what a volunteer can reasonably offer and requires a paid professional service provider, referrals will be made to service providers whose qualifications and references have been thoroughly checked or who are personally recommended by Sausalito Village members.

In addition to the service hotline, membership opens up the opportunity to become part of a vibrant community of people who share in many social, cultural, fitness, and recreational opportunities. Under a grant from the Sausalito Art Festival Foundation, Sausalito Village organizes and provides transportation to cultural programs and events in the San Francisco Bay area. Recent trips have included, among others, the Hess Collection and Winery in Napa, "The Paley Collection, A Taste for Modernism," at the De Young Museum, The Santa Rosa County Museum, and a San Francisco Symphony rehearsal. There are also periodic member lunches at Sausalito restaurants, monthly meetings with guest speakers, a chair yoga class, a memoir group, Thursday coffee hour, a walking group, a weekly bocce game, a book group, and numerous other activities.

We welcome both members and volunteers of any age. You do not need to be a Sausalito Village member to volunteer.

## National Park Service News for the Marin Headlands July 2013 to September 30

### **Come and See our Latest Addition: Battery Townsley's 16" Gun!**

On October 1, 2012, the National Park Service transported a giant naval gun to Fort Cronkhite for display at Battery Townsley. The "16-inch" weapon, 68 feet long and weighing 120 tons, was once on the battleship USS Missouri and is identical in size and caliber to the ones that protected the bay during World War II. The gun is now displayed outside Battery Townsley, while plans are developed to fabricate a replica gun carriage inside the casemate.

The 16-inch gun barrel, designated U.S. Navy Mark VII #386, is a key interpretive feature of Fort Cronkhite. It helps tell the stories of Battery Townsley and the men who served here and at the other harbor defense sites during World War II.

## Ecological Restoration at Muir Beach resumes with Phase 4

Redwood Creek Restoration at Muir Beach resumes construction this summer with the implementation of Phase 4. In this crucial phase, the Muir Beach parking lot will be re-aligned to allow the floodplain to function naturally. From about June through November 2013, the parking lot will be closed for construction. Residents and businesses (Pelican Inn and Golden Gate Dairy, for example) will have access to Pacific Way during construction. Parking and restrooms will not be available for the public. A public information campaign to notify visitors to Muir Beach is underway so that they can plan accordingly. Signs will be posted on Highway 101 and Highway 1, and additional traffic management will be provided at the entrance to Pacific Way.

In addition, a separate project will coincide with the Redwood

Creek project this summer. The National Park Service will construct a bus stop on Highway 1 in front of Golden Gate Dairy from July through August. Managers from each of the projects are working toward a coordination of efforts to minimize impacts to the community and Highway 1.

As contracts are awarded in the weeks prior to the June start date and in-depth discussions with contractors proceed, further details about the Redwood Creek construction schedule will be posted on the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy, the Golden Gate National Recreation Area and Muir Woods National Monument websites:

The Redwood Creek Restoration at Muir Beach is an ecological restoration project of the National Park Service and the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy. Construction occurs in phases over the summer and fall months. So far, Phases 1-3 were completed in 2009, 2010, and 2011. In 2013, the Phase 4 construction will re-align the Muir Beach parking lot to parallel Pacific Way.

The aerial photograph taken by landscape architect John Northmore Roberts shows the existing parking lot extending across the floodplain of the Redwood Creek mouth. Mr. Roberts prepared the schematic designs for the re-aligned parking lot. The current parking lot functions like a dam, constraining high flows and obstructing natural processes at the outflow of the nine square mile Redwood Creek drainage basin located on the southern flank of Mount Tamalpais. A portion of the new parking lot footprint northeast of the existing parking lot was cleared in advance of construction.

The Muir Beach parking lot relocation will enhance the creek's capacity to convey high flows and sediment to the Pacific Ocean. When completed, the creek will have a natural alignment and will be fully connected to its floodplain. The parking lot will no longer obstruct flow, habitat for endangered coho salmon and other wildlife will be enhanced, and visitors will experience a more natural coastal ecosystem. The transition requires extensive plant management to establish native plants and prevent extensive establishment of non-native plants during the transition period. The project fosters strong connections between people and the land through long-term stewardship and incorporation of Traditional Ecological Knowledge of the Coast Miwoks of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria.

## Do I Need a Permit to Cut My Tree?

City Staff often receives calls from residents with concerns that tree cutting in their neighborhood could be illegal. The City's regulations require permits to remove or alter trees located on public and private properties. The regulations vary depending if the tree is located in the public right-of-way or on private property.

For trees located on publicly owned property, whether in the public right-of-way, a city owned park, or open space, a permit is required to remove, trim or alter these trees. A permit for these trees can be obtained through the City's Department of Public Works.

For trees on privately owned property, the permitting body is the City's Trees and Views Committee. A Tree Removal or Alteration Permit is required for trees located on private property including:

- California Live Oaks, measuring 4 inches or larger in diameter as measured at breast height;
- Any tree other than "undesirable" trees (see discussion below), measured 10 inches or larger in diameter as measured at breast height; and
- Any tree dedicated by the City Council or Sausalito Woman's Club.

Yearly or routine pruning of private trees is not considered an Alteration and does not require a permit. Yearly or routine pruning consists of normal, seasonal maintenance pruning, trimming, shaping or thinning necessary to the tree's health, growth and view maintenance, however, foliage reduction should not exceed one quarter of the total tree foliage.

There are also certain types of trees located on private property that are considered "undesirable" and may be removed or altered without a permit. "Undesirable" trees are; Blue Gum Eucalyptus, Monterey Pine, Monterey Cypress, Coastal Redwood, Blackwood Acacia, Bailey Acacia and Green Wattle.

Property Owners responsible for removing or altering trees without obtaining the required permits, have done so illegally, are subject to strict code enforcement action and will be cited for the violation (citations could be a monetary fine up to \$1,000). To report the illegal removal of trees please contact the Community Development Department at **289-4128** during normal business hours.

## Thinking About Remodeling Your Kitchen or Bathroom?

The Sausalito Community Development Department staff would like to assist you with your remodel project. You can now submit your plans at the Community Development Department public counter five days a week. Simple kitchen and bathroom remodel projects which do not involve structural issues (such as moving walls or adding windows) can be reviewed and approved by staff on an overnight basis or quicker, with the condition that all building code requirements are met. Please visit our public counter or website at <http://www.ci.sausalito.ca.us/Index.aspx?page=887> for guides on building code requirements for bathroom and kitchen remodel projects. Our City Hall public counter is

open on Mondays from 7:30am-4:30pm, Tuesdays-Thursdays 7:30am-5pm, and Fridays 7:30am-noon.

We will help you with the building code requirements so you can efficiently design your project to meet the applicable codes. We are committed to ensuring that all construction within Sausalito is done with your safety in mind and in accordance with current codes.

## Do I Need Garbage Pick-Up Service?

Did you know that it is unlawful for anyone in the City to burn, bury, throw away, carry over any street or otherwise dispose of garbage in any way other than having garbage service collection at their residence or business? Occasionally Sausalito residents and business owners do not know that they need garbage service, and that garbage cannot be transported from one location to another, or dropped off in a public garbage can or dumpster. Every property owner or occupant of every residence and of any business where garbage or recyclable material is accumulated is required to have garbage and recycling service.

Garbage and recycling service is necessary to keep properties clean, and free from odor and pests. Section 12.24.040.A of the Sausalito Municipal Code says that every owner or occupant of a residences and a business where garbage or recyclable material is accrued must arrange for weekly residential garbage and recycling service. ## Accessory Dwelling Units

The City of Sausalito has new rules about Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs)! An ADU, also known as a "mother-in-law" or "granny" unit, is an additional living unit that has separate kitchen, sleeping, and bathroom facilities, attached or detached from the primary residential unit on a lot. It is smaller than the primary unit but can used as a rental unit, or for guests or family. As of January 2013 ADUs are allowed in residential neighborhoods under certain conditions. Additionally, only until March 31, 2014, the City will also grant amnesty to existing unpermitted ADUs. Act now to take advantage of reduced permitting fees! 

### Willow Creek Update

Willow Creek's 12th year is rapidly coming to a close. May and June are when we host Open Houses for both our Lower and Upper Schools to celebrate a year of learning and play: sentences have been parsed and vocabulary words have been digested; math equations have been applied to solving our trash problems; art shows illustrate our issues and successes and music exposes what seems to be a talent buried in each of our students. The campus is humming with excitement about the close of one year and knowing there is a break ahead before a new school year takes hold.

This has been an exciting and productive year. Our Creek Restoration Project continues to become a more and more important part of our school curriculum. We celebrated Global Service Day, April 27th, at the Creek creating an outdoor classroom complete with supplies and materials for classes to use while working in the creek area. We have also become involved with several new projects: Working with the Sausalito Arts Festival Foundation, we were privileged to pilot their Artists Teaching Art program which provided our students with

some very exciting opportunities in mosaic production, stage set and costume development and videography.

But, perhaps the most moving project was the care and hatching of trout eggs to be released in Lake Lagunitas. Last year, our 3rd graders carefully nurtured a collection of trout eggs. The eggs hatched, but unfortunately within about 36 hours of hatching all of the trout died. The students were very, very sad that they were not able to release their trout into a large body of water. They discussed various reasons as to why the babies did not survive, but there did not seem to be a definitive reason. So, this year, when the trout grew large enough to join their brethren in Lake Lagunitas there was great cheering and encouragement. All of Willow Creek is looking forward to the summer and we are expecting to welcome approximate 60 additional students and their families in the fall when school resumes. ## Driving on Narrow Roadways

The city of Sausalito is a beautiful town that is filled to the brim with charm. It has a network of winding hillside roadways which are lined with handsome foliage. While the hillside roadways add to the beautiful ambiance of Sausalito, they do not lend themselves to easy driving conditions. It is important while driving in the hills of Sausalito to be a courteous driver and follow the rules of the road.

Early in Sausalito's history, central hillside paths were created to navigate the forming township. Navigation through the hills was based on walking and horse-drawn carriages. As the automobile became more prevalent in society, engineered roadways were developed. Many of our roadways today are still very narrow and "path-like" which makes them difficult to traverse.

While driving through the narrow streets on Sausalito's hillsides it is important to maintain control of your vehicle at all times. Free yourself from other distractions such as your cellular phone. Be mindful of your speed. Do not drive with an obstructed view such as

a foggy windshield. Drive as far to the right side of the road as safety permits.

According to California Vehicle Code Section 21661, the uphill driver has the right of way. This section of the vehicle code states in part: "Whenever upon any grade the width of the roadway is insufficient to permit the passing of vehicles approaching from opposite directions at the point of meeting, the driver of the vehicle descending the grade shall yield the right-of-way to the vehicle ascending the grade and shall, if necessary, back his vehicle to a place in the highway where it is possible for the vehicles to pass."

The uphill vehicle's engine is under greater strain; therefore, the downhill driver is viewed as having better control and can more easily and safely make way. While this is the rule, nothing prevents either driver from pulling to the right and allowing approaching traffic to pass if there is room. Courtesy goes a long way towards making our community a safe and functional place.



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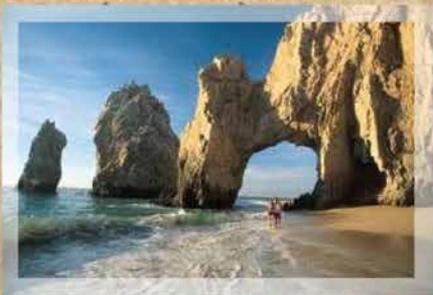
