Sausalito and Viña del Mar The Sister City relationship between Sausalito and Viña del Mar, Established 1960

In April 2013, Michael R. Moyle, a Sausalito resident and member of the Sausalito/Viña del Mar Sister City Committee wrote the following article that explored the origins and initial phase of the sister city relationship between Sausalito and Viña del Mar that was established in 1960. The result of Mr. Moyle's research offers an in-depth timeline of the Sausalito and Viña del Mar Sister City relationship.

The majority of the materials upon which this article is based are located in the archives of the Sausalito Historical Society.

* * * * *

White House Conference on Citizen Diplomacy – 1956

The Sausalito/ Viña del Mar sister city relationship has spanned over 50 years and holds the title of the first and oldest Sausalito sister city. Through the leadership of an unexpected individual, United States President Dwight Eisenhower. President Eisenhower believed that international relations would be enhanced by personal diplomacy and other direct nongovernmental contact between individuals in the United States and overseas. As a result, in September 1956, the President convened a Conference on Citizen Diplomacy at the White House in Washington, D.C., to help to promote this initiative.

The Conference on Citizen Diplomacy resulted in the establishment of a number of committees, which pursued President Eisenhower's idea in various ways under the theme "people-to-people." One of them was the Civic Committee which, with the assistance of the National League of Cities organization and the Office of Private Cooperation of

the United States Information Agency, developed and promoted the idea of creating "sister cities" between United States and overseas cities.

The Beginning of Sausalito's Efforts to Find a Sister City – 1958

The genesis of Sausalito's interest in the fledgling sister city program dates to early 1958 when Sausalito Mayor Howard Sievers attended a meeting of the League of California Cities at which the new people-to-people program was discussed. Mayor Sievers then brought the idea back to Sausalito.

Later that year Mr. Mark Bortman, the Chairman of the Civic Committee, visited Sausalito where he made a presentation about how to establish a sister city program. Not long thereafter the Sausalito City Council appointed Council Member Marjorie Brady to chair a City Council committee to study a possible sister city program. That led in a short time to the organization of the Sausalito Citizens' Committee for the People-to-People Program (the "Sausalito Committee") with Mrs. M. Justin ("Gladys") Herman of Sausalito elected as the Committee's Chairperson.

Narrowing the Search for a Sister City – 1958-59

Although it has not been possible to locate any record of the process by which the Sausalito Committee reached its ultimate decision to recommend Viña del Mar as Sausalito's sister city, it appears that the committee members studied various regions and cities around the world for possible sister city candidates. It was reported that after preliminary study, "the preference soon narrowed to South America because of its importance and because teaching of Spanish had just been introduced in Sausalito's elementary schools."

By June of 1959 it appears that the search for an appropriate South American sister city had narrowed to Chile, "Chile appears to be the country in which it would be most likely to find a waterfront community which would possibly affiliate with Sausalito."

First Contact with Viña del Mar – 1959-60

Between June and November of 1959, it appears that the Sausalito Committee identified Viña del Mar as its first choice for a sister city. Contact was made with Viña del Mar, and the idea of establishing a sister city relationship was proposed. The mayor of Viña, the Honorable Gustavo Lorca Rojas, took up the idea with equal enthusiasm."

On February 2, 1960, Sausalito City Council Member Marjorie Brady read to the Sausalito City Council a telegram from Mayor Lorca formally accepting Sausalito's proposal that the cities become sister cities. Later that month the Sausalito City Council acted to rename Sausalito's central square, which had, up to that time, been named Depot Park, as "Viña del Mar Plaza."

Formal Ceremonies to Establish the Relationship – 1960

On March 5, 1960, a ceremony was held at Sausalito's Alta Mira Hotel attended by, among others, Sausalito Mayor Howard Sievers, Mrs. Herman, and Eugenio Ovalle, Chile's Consul General in San Francisco.

At the event Mayor Sievers signed a formal Proclamation stating “that the City of Sausalito accepts with pleasure adoption by the City of Viña del Mar and in turn adopts with pride the City of Viña del Mar as its Sister City.”

At the same time in Viña del mar, the city renamed its El Tranque soccer stadium, and the park that surrounds it, after Sausalito, changing their names to Estadio Sausalito and Parque Municipal Sausalito, respectively. The events were celebrated in a ceremony held at the newly renamed Parque Municipal Sausalito on March 12, 1960.

It is interesting to note that this emphasis on individual private citizens providing the primary support for the sister city program was present in the sister city program at the outset, and continues today.

Subsequent Developments

One of the most significant subsequent events from a physical standpoint occurred on March 4, 1961, when, as part of the celebration of the first anniversary of the establishment of the sister city relationship, a plaque, presented by the Sausalito Lions Club, was unveiled on the base of the elephant standing at the north end of the entrance to Sausalito’s Plaza Viña del Mar. That plaque remains there today.

In the Fall of 1968 a well-known Chilean sculptor named Sergio Castillo Mandiola who was studying at UC Berkeley learned of the sister city relationship and offered to erect a sculpture to honor that relationship. Funding for the project was provided by the Sausalito Foundation and the sculpture—entitled “Hermandad”—was erected by Mr. Castillo near the current site of Gabrielson Park along the Sausalito waterfront very close to Plaza Viña del Mar. That sculpture was damaged in the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake, but was repaired and re-erected in Gabrielson Park at the site where it can be found today.

After decades of inactivity, the sister city relationship has now been revitalized. An important catalyst for this increased activity was the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the sister city relationship in 2010. That celebration included a new plaque commemorating the anniversary now affixed to the base of the elephant located at the southern end of the entrance to Plaza Viña del Mar.

* * * * *

Relationship Rejuvenated

The saga continues today with an international exchange that benefits and enriches both cities and the societies of Sausalito and Viña del Mar. 2013 has been a busy year for the Viña del Mar Operations Council.

- **A Taste of Viña del Mar** - January 26, 2013 - To promote an entrepreneurial exchange with Chilean business woman, Sausalito’s civic leaders hosted a “friendraiser” at the historic Pines Mansion to benefit the April 2014 trade mission when seven woman business owners from Vina del Mar visited Sausalito and

the Bay Area to share success stories and best practices with local women business owners.

- **A Visit to Viña del Mar** - A delegation of six Sausalito civic leaders, including Mayor Herb Weiner, travelled to Vina del Mar in February 2013. In addition to meeting with the Agep-V (Asociacion Gremial de Empresarias Y Profesionales) to prepare for the April trade mission to Northern California, Seven Women, Seven Dreams, Seven Days, the delegation met with Mayor Reginato and were able to join in the Celebration of the International Day of Women.
- **Viña del Mar Visits the Bay Area** – In April 2013, our First Annual Seven Women, Seven Dreams, Seven Days program was initiated. Seven Chilean businesswomen and entrepreneurs were hosted in private residences in Sausalito and Marin. This highly successful week was filled with workshops, seminars and social events. We look forward to hosting the Second Annual Seven Women, Seven Dreams, and Seven Days in April 2014.
- **A Viña del Mar Artist** – The Sausalito Art Festival – In September, 2012, German Von Appen, an artist from Viña del Mar, exhibited his works at the Sausalito Art Festival. Viña del Mar Operations Council felt that artists should be given opportunities to participate and meet with other artists at important art exchanges such as the Sausalito Art Festival. We hope to invite another artist to a Bay Area festival in 2014 and are investigating the opportunities.
- **Connecting Youth** - Our Pen Pal Program in which students from the Willow Creek Academy correspond with students from Colegio Sagrada Familia in Viña del Mar is ongoing, active and very successful. Through cross-cultural dialogue, these young people become better-informed global citizens. In a recent visit to Viña del Mar, Operations Council board member and retired teacher, Lizzie Jeremi, spent time with the Chilean students

Keeping the doors open to fresh ideas will only improve personal understanding and influence global relations via the human touch and personal relations at all levels. In 2014, we look forward to expanding our outreach within our local Chilean Community and plan to develop and extend our involvement in many Chilean cultural and social events in the Bay Area. Working with our San Francisco Chilean Consulate Rolando Ortega will be an integral part of this process. A Tale of Two Cities: Sausalito and its Newest Sister, Cascais, Portugal

IT ALL STARTED one hundred and twenty five years ago with the picturesque Sausalito “Holy Ghost” parade held, as it has since, every year, on Pentecost Sunday (the seventh Sunday after Easter). For the past 120 years, the colorful procession—fire engine in the lead, with marching band following in military step playing a Sousa-inspired march, the elegant teen-age queens with white, purple, and red royal capes flanked by their flower maids, trailed by the dignitaries in suits carrying the official flags and banners of their respective Halls, accompanied by the Mayor of Sausalito and city officials—making its way up the steep winding hills of Sausalito to the Star of Sea Church. For the past century and a quarter, families with young children gathered on the streets and leaned from balconies to waive at the parade as it passed by.

It was five and a half years ago, during this very same Holy Ghost parade, marching down Caledonia Street, that Mayor Herb Wiener suggested that we explore a sister city between Sausalito and Portugal.

And why not? The Azorean Portuguese were among the earliest settlers of Sausalito—as early as the 1830s and 1850s. First the whalers arrived establishing a beachhead at Whaler’s Cove, next came the boat builders constructing wooden dories in newly established waterfront shipyards, followed by fisherman casting their nets for the annual sardine and anchovy runs while anchored off the Sausalito seashore, and finally the dairy farmers, who ranched hills above Sausalito and tended their herds of cattle. This Azorean community was sizeable, and represented approximately one-quarter of the population of Sausalito and Southern Marin at the turn of the century.

At the Mayor’s suggestion, the proposal for a Portuguese sister city with Sausalito was brought to the Portuguese “Holy Ghost” Hall, the non-descript building at 511 Caledonia, on north end of the street, the “IDESST.” “IDESST” an acronym for “Irmandade de Espirito Santo e Santissima Trindade,” Portuguese for the “Brotherhood of the Holy Ghost and the Sacred Trinity.” The IDESST Hall was originally established by the Portuguese immigrants on Filbert Street in 1888—making it older than the City of Sausalito itself. With the enthusiastic support of the IDESST Board, a search began to find a suitable Portuguese sister for Sausalito. First, the cities and towns of the 9 Azorean Island archipelago were explored. It was quickly determined that with the vast number of the American-Portuguese on the East and West Coasts from the Azores, each Azorean city and town already had multiple U.S. sister city relationships. Next the mainland of Portugal was explored, and the City of Cascais (pronounced “cash-kaish”), was chosen as a good candidate for a sister city with Sausalito.

In keeping with a sister-city relationship, Cascais and Sausalito share many of the same characteristics. Cascais, like Sausalito, had its beginnings as a fishing village, with a strong maritime tradition. Like Sausalito, Cascais is now a commuter suburb of a much larger neighboring city (in the case of Cascais: Lisbon). The cities have

similar topographies: rocky coastlines and a mountain near Cascais, Sierra de Sintra, which looks very much like Mount Tamalpais—if Mount Tamalpais had a Romanticist castle instead of a ranger station at its peak. Even climates of the two cities are very similar; with hot interior and a cool marine layer that creates the dense fog we are so familiar with. To top things off, there is a bridge that connects Lisbon over the Tejo river, that looks uncannily like the Golden Gate Bridge.

With these similarities in mind, three and a half years ago a trip was arranged to Cascais to meet with the city officials there. The enthusiastic reception was not expected—the Cascais city officials were thrilled by the proposal for a sister city with Sausalito. Cascais had been seeking a U.S. sister city for some time. Cascais had just been approached by Pittsburgh as possible sister city, but then the Sausalito proposal literally walked through the door. Needless to say, Sausalito seemed to be a better fit to the Cascais City officials for a sister city relationship, and the wheels were set in motion.

A year and a half ago Cascais invited a delegation from Sausalito to travel to Cascais as part of a Sister City ceremonies. Councilwoman Linda Pfeiffer led the delegation that represented Sausalito. This spring Sausalito reciprocated, inviting a delegation from Cascais to visit Sausalito to formally establish the Sister City relationship, which was ratified on May 5th of this year at ceremonies held at Vina Del Mar Plaza. We now look forward to continuing and strengthening our ties with Cascais and the as Sausalito’s newest sister city.

PAST AND CURRENT CASCAIS SISTER PROJECTS

What does a Sister City do? The primary purpose of a Sister City relationship is to build culturally, educational, and business-to-business exchanges. The following is a list of just some of the accomplishments and goals of the Sausalito-Cascais Sister City program:

- **America’s Cup:** The Sausalito-Cascais Sister City Committee provided logistical support to the Cascais Redbull America’s Cup Youth Sailing team. The team came in 3rd overall, beating many larger counties, including two Oracle USA teams, Germany, France, and Sweden.
- **Youth Sailing Exchange:** The Sausalito-Cascais Sister City Committee is currently working to establish an annual reciprocal youth sailing exchange program with the Clube Naval de Cascais.
- **Cultural Performances:** The Sausalito-Cascais Sister City Committee has provided a number of Portuguese cultural events involving Portuguese food, wine and music, such as the “Noite de Fado”, which included tickets to see Mariza, the most popular current fadista (Portuguese fado singer). “Fado” is the Portuguese musical art form sometimes referred to as the “Portuguese blues” due to the soulful laments of the fado.

- **Student Field Trip to Portugal:** The New Village School of Sausalito is visiting Cascais this Fall and will participate in educational and cultural events arranged by the City of Cascais as an outcome of the sister-city relationship.
- **Azorean Headlands Dairy Children's Book:** The Sausalito-Cascais Sister City Committee is working to publish a children's book, Mila and her Lost Calf, which tells of a young Portuguese-Azorean dairy farmer's daughter who loses her calf while tending to her herd on her parent's dairy ranch in the Sausalito headlands.
- **Calçadas and Azulejos:** The Sausalito-Cascais Sister City Committee is working to place decorative Portuguese cobblestones as a monument to the sister-city relationship at Gabrielson Park. Another potential project is to place Portuguese ceramic tile artwork at a location in Sausalito.
- **Historical Photos and Plaques:** The Sausalito-Cascais Sister City Committee created and donated four large historical photos of the Portuguese dairy farmers in Marin County to the IDESST Hall and is working on placing a plaque at the Rotary Housing to the "Chamarita Room" to note the historical significance of the structure and property to the Sausalito Portuguese community.

OUR MISSION

Our mission is to preserve a gathering place on Sausalito's unique waterfront to engage and educate the public about our rich maritime history and small craft heritage through affordable direct experience. The community boating center will advocate environmental awareness, seamanship and safety, promote the use, building and display of traditional wooden boats and maritime crafts and teach life skills through maritime education. It will be a place for local maritime groups to hold classes, access the waterfront and build community through outreach.

WHY A HERRING FESTIVAL?

The Herring fishery is the last commercial fishery left in SF Bay, and one that can often be closely observed from the Sausalito water's edge. Hosting an annual Herring Festival feels to us the perfect way to promote our mission while raising funds for the community boating center. We include the fishery itself, tell people what they see, teach the history of fishing San Francisco Bay, and the process of bringing food to your table. There used to be a fish dock right here in Sausalito, many people remember it, and now most don't even know why the fish is caught and how it's regulated. Many of the fishermen and women travel from far away just for this two-month season, then they disappear until next year and we never get to meet them. Some are local, but their boats are now in San Francisco. We hope to meet them here and welcome them with a celebration of what they do. Many of the Sausalito population hear the ruckus on the water, birds diving, seals, hunting, but what does it all mean? Modern life severs the connection to nature more and more. We like to bring some connection back, to better take care of the environment.

Lastly, we feel it is important to know where our food comes from, be open to new culinary adventures, have all food be sustainable and with a low carbon footprint. Luckily, this is catching on and we hope that by promoting this little shiny fish we reach even more folks.

There are numbers of small fish that only get caught to feed the big farmed fish. How many pounds of herring do you need to get one pound of farmed salmon, how about farmed tuna? Where is the biodiversity going with this practice? Couldn't we eat a pound of herring instead and help the wild salmon along? We hope to address some of these questions and concerns during this event as well.

And we want to raise funds for Cass Gidley Marina, a Sausalito Community Boating Center, because we still need funding to make access to Richardson Bay for everyone possible.

WHERE IS THE FESTIVAL?

Gabrielson Park, adjacent to the ferry landing on the Sausalito waterfront.

WHEN IS THE FESTIVAL?

Every year the herring migrate to spawn in San Francisco Bay and their arrival is heralded by a riot of birds and marine mammals that feed on the fish and the eggs they lay. We can not predict exactly when they will arrive, but in years past the season is in full swing by late January. Therefore the festival date will be scheduled by the beginning of January for a Saturday afternoon in late January or early February, depending on when the fish arrive in the Bay. We will work with Fish and Wildlife biologists to set an appropriate date and announce it as soon as we can. We have tentatively set the 9th of February as our preferred date.

WHAT WILL YOU SEE AT THE FESTIVAL?

- Local coffee, beer and assorted wines from a private donation
- Information about herring, the fishery, sustainability, and the environment by California Fish and Wildlife, Sea Stewards, Marine Mammal Center, Herring Fishery representatives and other environmental stewardship organizations
- Live pickling, smoking and cooking demonstrations and talks by local chefs and food experts
- Kids' area with games and activities
- Historic herring fishery photographs and the traditional SF Bay fishing boats presented by the San Francisco Maritime National Historic Park
- Display of Herring Festival Art Contest winning entries
- Modern fishing vessels and roe on kelp harvesting techniques
- Evening banquet following the festival at an indoor location

Sausalito Historical Society

The Sausalito Historical Society has launched a self-guided walking tour along the Sausalito waterfront, which includes six interpretive graphic panels placed temporarily along the route. The walking tour begins at the Ice House Visitors Center and Historic exhibit at 780 Bridgeway, where the Society hosted a launch party in September. There is a welcome banner and two introductory panels outside the Ice House, and six additional themed waterfront panels on the walking tour placed from Gabrielson Park south along Bridgeway.

At the same time the Historical Society has opened an exhibition of sailing related art and artifacts from its own archives and members' collections in the Society's Exhibit Room on the top floor of City Hall at 420 Litho Street. The art exhibition is open to the public Wednesdays and Saturdays, from 10am to 1pm. Admission to either installation is free.

The walking tour was designed by The Sibbett Group exhibition designers, Jessica Brainard & Associates interpretive planners, Leslie Stone Associates graphic designers and Renée Harcourt Design graphic designer—all firms based in Sausalito and volunteering their services. It has been approved by the Bay Conservation and Development Commission and the City Council and endorsed by the Parks and Recreation Department, the Hospitality and Business Committee and the Chamber of Commerce.

In addition to the Discover & Go online service, the Library offers free general admission tickets to the de Young Museum and the Palace of the Legion of Honor in San Francisco. Every adult library card holder living in Sausalito is entitled to two tickets per year. Tickets are purchased through a generous grant to the Friends of the Library from the Sausalito Art Festival Foundation.

BESTSELLER BOOKS AND DVDS

The Library features two collections of popular materials. The Bestseller Books and DVDs are in a display area across from the Circulation Desk.

- **The Bestseller Book collection** features current bestselling and in-demand books. Titles in this collection may be checked out for fourteen days. The books are not holdable, which means that new and hot titles will be available to browse and check out.
- **The Bestseller DVD collection** consists of popular and recently released Hollywood and foreign films. Bestseller DVDs are not holdable, and titles may be checked out for three days at a time.

RETURN YOUR BOOKS WITHOUT COMING TO THE LIBRARY

If the Library is closed or you are too busy to come inside, your checked-out books, DVDs, and other Library materials may be returned to either of our two drop box locations. A pair of drive-through boxes, one for books and the other for CDs and DVDs, can be found at the far end of the City Hall parking lot, accessible via Bee Street. There are also walk-up drop boxes adjacent to the Litho Street doors to City Hall. Sausalito Public Library materials may also be returned to any public library in Marin.

Sausalito V.I.P.s Anyone Home?

Sausalito residents rest easier while on vacation knowing that the Sausalito's Volunteers in Public Safety (VIPS) have checked their home while they are away. The VIPS are a group of dedicated volunteers who assist the police department in protecting and serving the Sausalito community. Vacation house checks are just one of the many tasks that the VIPS do to assist the Police Department. A few of the other items include helping with special events, traffic control, and administrative projects. With the VIPS conducting vacation house checks, the Sausalito Police Department is able to maintain a high level of service for its residents.

If you are planning to go on vacation, you will need to complete a vacation house check form. The VIPS will visit your home and 1) check for excessive mail, packages, and newspapers; 2) check if all accessible windows and doors are secure, and 3) walk the property looking for anything suspicious. VIPS immediately report anything out of the ordinary to the Sausalito Police Department and an officer is dispatched to your home to check on it. While conducting a vacation house check, VIPS wear their official VIPS uniform and carry their official VIPS Identification Card.

VIPS are fellow residents and trustworthy citizens of Sausalito who have been screened by the police department. There are currently 23 active VIPS members. They are graduates of the Sausalito Police Department's 'Citizen Academy' who have received extensive training in all aspects of our police services. Additionally, they all pass an

in-depth background check, are fingerprinted, and must wear their uniform and carry their ID card when on duty.



A prerequisite of becoming a member of the VIPS is to attend and graduate from the Sausalito Police Department's 'Citizen Academy'. The academy is designed to give citizens the opportunity to learn about departmental operations and get to know the officers on a more personal level. The attendees gain new insights into existing police services and have an opportunity to provide input for future policing goals. All who live or work in the City of Sausalito are invited to apply for this eight-week program.

Getting to Know Marin County's Newest Health Plan

For thirty-five years SCAN Health Plan has been focusing exclusively on the unique needs of seniors and others on Medicare—and in 2014 SCAN will offer three health plans in Marin County. SCAN is a not-for-profit health plan that was founded by a group of seniors who were frustrated by their lack of access to services and who wanted an organization that addressed their specific needs. Those seniors formed the Senior Care Action Network, now known as SCAN Health Plan. The goal of the organization then was the same as it is today.

“For more than three and a half decades, SCAN has been committed to providing services that enhance seniors’ ability to manage their health and to continue to control where and how they live,” said Karen Sugano, SCAN’s general manager in Northern California. “Although SCAN is new to Marin County, we have a long history of serving seniors and others on Medicare.”

Unlike most Medicare Advantage plans, SCAN has no commercial members, which allows it to dedicate 100 percent of its energy and programs toward serving older adults across the wide spectrum of aging. Its focus is to provide affordable and accessible quality healthcare to seniors and to continue to look for innovative ways to serve Medicare members’ healthcare needs.

One of SCAN’s innovative programs is “Classroom in the Community,” a series of health education presentations that provide seniors with simple information they need to take action on their health. “As a senior-focused health plan, we recognized that we needed to do more than just bring health education out into the community—we needed to make sure that the health information being delivered was understandable,” said Delena Penner, SCAN’s community outreach manager. “Choosing a healthy lifestyle, knowing how to seek medical care, and taking advantage of preventive measures require that people understand and use health information.”

“Classroom in the Community” programs will be offered the fourth Wednesday of every month, January through March, from 10:30am to 11:30am in the Edgewater Room at City Hall. The presentations are co-sponsored by Sausalito Village, Edgewater Senior’s Club and The City of Sausalito’s Age Friendly Task Force.

Sausalito Village

Sausalito Village is dedicated to providing practical assistance, social connections, and resources that enable our members to stay independent, active, and supported in their Sausalito homes and connected to the community as long as possible, as they grow older. Sausalito Village is operated by an all volunteer steering committee under the fiscal sponsorship of Community Initiatives, a California nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization, and is not affiliated with Marin Villages. Visit our website at www.sausalitovillage.org.

A key element of membership in Sausalito Village is a telephone number that you can call to request assistance and referrals to the types of services and support you require. Most of our referrals are to a dedicated team of more than 50 volunteers, all of whom have been thoroughly vetted and passed a background check. These volunteers are available to help with transportation, take a member grocery shopping, pick up prescriptions, run an occasional errand, assist with computers and other electronic equipment, and make friendly home visits or daily or weekly phone checks. At the request of a member, trained volunteers will do a safety assessment of the member's home, make recommendations for modifications that can be taken to reduce risks, and refer the member to volunteer and/or paid service providers to accomplish these modifications. A health care advocacy group, consisting of volunteers with experience in some area of the health care field, will assist members in navigating their way through the increasingly complicated health care system to ensure that their individual needs are identified and appropriately addressed.

When the type of assistance needed by a member goes beyond what a volunteer can reasonably offer and requires the help of a paid professional, referrals will be made to service providers whose qualifications and references have been thoroughly checked or who are personally recommended by Sausalito Village members.

In addition to the service hotline, membership opens up the opportunity to become part of a vibrant community of people who share in many social, cultural, and recreational events. Under a grant from the Sausalito Art Festival Foundation, Sausalito Village organizes and provides transportation to many cultural programs and events in the San Francisco Bay area. Recent trips have included, among others, visits to the Diebenkorn exhibit at the De Young Museum, the Di Rosa Museum in Sonoma, The Cyrus Cylinder and the Larry Ellison Collection at the Asian Art Museum, The Impressionists on the Water Exhibit at the Palace of Legion of Honor, the San Francisco Mission District Murals, and the Chabot Space and Science Center in Oakland. There are also monthly member get-togethers, monthly meetings with guest speakers, a chair yoga class, a memoir group, a weekly bocce game, a book group, volunteer recognition events, and numerous other activities.




