Congratulations Sausalito! This past November, over sixty percent of you that voted helped pass Measure O to make infrastructure improvements to our city, including parks. The half-a-percent sales tax will provide approximately \$1 million dollars additional revenue into our annual capital improvement budget and your Park and Recreation Commission will be looking for any opportunity to direct some funds to park improvements. We never expected this money to be for park reconstruction like what is planned for Sweeny and Dunphy, but we do believe that over the next ten years there will be opportunities for us to participate in smaller, leveraged projects. The Commission appreciates your support of Measure O.

Winter is the time when our parks get a small break from the community events, athletic teams and tourist traffic. However, there is no break from the great programs the recreation department continues to provide the residents of Sausalito. Take a long look at this quarter's magazine for great ideas to help your New Year's resolutions or to shake of the doldrums of spending more time inside. Bring the kids to Playland at the MLK gymnasium, stop by the alive and always improving Sausalito Library at City Hall, tour the Historical Society Ice House on Bridgeway across from Casa Madrona, take a dance class, or yoga. There is so much to do and such little time, before you know it Jazz and Blues by the Bay and the spring event calendar will be in full swing. (Jazz table registration starts in early January.)

## Cass Gidley Marina— a Sausalito Community Boating Center Presents the 3rd Annual Sausalito Herring Festival

January 25, 2015 from 11am–3 pm

Our mission is to preserve a gathering place on Sausalito's unique waterfront to engage and educate the public about our rich maritime history and small craft heritage through affordable direct experience. The community boating center will advocate environmental awareness, seamanship and safety, promote the use, building and display of traditional wooden boats and maritime crafts and teach life skills through maritime education. It will be a place for local maritime groups to hold classes, access the waterfront and build community through outreach.

### Why a Herring Festival?

The Herring fishery is the last commercial fishery left in SF Bay, and one that can often be closely observed from the Sausalito water's edge. Hosting an annual Herring Festival feels to us the perfect way to promote our mission while raising funds for the community boating center.

We include the fishery itself, tell people what they see, teach the history of fishing San Francisco Bay, and the process of bringing food to your table. There used to be a fish dock right here in Sausalito, many people remember it, and now most don't even know why the fish is caught and how it's regulated.

Many of the fishermen and women travel from far away just for this 2 month season, then they disappear until next year and we never get to meet them. Some are local, but their boats are now in San Francisco. We hope to meet them here and welcome them with a celebration of what they do. Many of the Sausalito population hear the ruckus on the water, birds diving, seals hunting, but what does it all mean? Modern life severs the connection to nature more and more. We like to bring some connection back, to better take care of the environment.

Lastly, we feel it is important to know where our food comes from, be open to new culinary adventures, have all food be sustainable and with a low carbon footprint. Luckily, this is catching on and we hope that by promoting this little shiny fish we reach even more folks.

There are numbers of small fish that only get caught to feed the big farmed fish. How many pounds of herring do you need to get one pound of

farmed salmon, how about farmed tuna? Where is the biodiversity going with this practice? Couldn't we eat a pound of herring instead and help the wild salmon along? We hope to address some of these questions and concerns during this event as well.

And we want to raise funds for Cass Gidley Marina—a Sausalito Community Boating Center, because we still need funding to make access to Richardson Bay for everyone possible.

### Where is the festival?

Gabrielson Park, adjacent to the ferry landing on the Sausalito waterfront or in case of rain the festival moves to the Bay Model.

### When is the Festival?

Every year the herring migrate to spawn in San Francisco Bay and their arrival is heralded by a riot of birds and marine mammals that feed on the fish and the eggs they lay. We can not predict exactly when they will arrive, but in years past the season is in full swing by late January. Therefore the festival date will be confirmed by the beginning of January for a Sunday, January 25th or another Sunday in late January/early February depending on when the fish arrive in the Bay. We work with Fish and Wildlife biologists and the fishing fleet to set an appropriate date and confirm it in early January. For 2015 we have set the 25th of January as our preferred date.

### What will you see at the festival?

- Live music and performances
- Many culinary specialties by local restaurants and chefs, choose your size of herring sampler plate or get some traditional festival french fries
- Local coffee, beer and assorted wines from a private donation
- Information about herring, the fishery, sustainability, and the environment by California Fish and Wildlife, Sea Stewards, Marine Mammal Center, Herring Fishery representatives and other environmental stewardship organizations
- Live pickling, smoking and cooking demonstrations and talks by local chefs and food experts
- Kids' area with games and activities
- Historic herring fishery photographs and the traditional SF Bay fishing boats presented by the San Francisco Maritime National Historic Park
- Display of Herring Festival Art Contest winning entries
- Modern fishing vessels and roe on kelp harvesting techniques
- Evening banquet following the festival at an indoor location

## The Sausalito Historical Society Schools' Program: Four Years and Growing

In 2010, the Sausalito Historical Society (SHS) piloted a program about Sausalito history in the Sausalito Public Schools for third grade students at Willow Creek Academy and Bayside School. Now in its fourth successful year, this annual educational program endorsed by teachers, parents and students alike, has grown from 45 to 65 students and from one curriculum unit to three.

The goal of the program is to encourage teachers and students to explore Sausalito's interesting past. The first unit features a then-and-now appreciation of Sausalito's historic downtown buildings and businesses. The second portrays colorful personalities and families from Sausalito's past and the most recent unit explains and documents the history of the World War II shipyard, Marinship.

In the course of the year, the students write about a specific topic such as an individual building, a person or a Marinship job and have their pictures taken in a theme related photo. At the end of the year, the students attend an awards ceremony and receive a framed document that includes the photo and their own writing.

### SAUSALITO NEWS ARCHIVE

Thanks to a generous grant from the Sausalito Library Foundation we are now able to offer online access to digital archives of *The Sausalito News* from 1885 to 1957. The Sausalito News was Sausalito's weekly newspaper until it went out of business in 1966. ### Three Feet for Safety Act

On September 23, 2013, Governor Jerry Brown signed AB 1371 (Three Feet for Safety Act) into law. On September 16, 2014, the law went into effect which made California the 22nd State to enact a defined buffer zone between cyclists and overtaking motorists' vehicles. The purpose of this new law is to create awareness and make our roadways a safer place.

The new law is found in California Vehicle Code Section 21760. It has three requirements:

1. A driver passing a bicycle, while going in the same direction, must pass at a safe distance and cannot interfere with the safe operation of the bicycle, considering the size and speed of the driver's vehicle, as well as traffic conditions, weather, visibility, and surface and width of the road.
2. The driver cannot pass at a distance of less than three feet between any part of the vehicle (including the side mirror) and any part of the bicycle or its rider (including the handlebars).
3. If the driver cannot pass at a distance of at least three feet as a result of traffic or road conditions, the driver must slow to a reasonable and prudent speed and may pass only when doing so would not endanger the safety of the bicycle rider, considering the size and speed of the driver's vehicle, as well as traffic conditions, weather, visibility, and surface and width of the road.

The fine for unsafe passing without injury to the cyclist is \$35 (\$154 after court and administrative fees). The fine applied to a driver who is involved in a collision that results in injury to a cyclist is \$220 (\$959 after fees). This second penalty is equal to the fine imposed for reckless driving with injury.

Since this law has gone into effect, the Sausalito Police Department has received several questions regarding how the new code will affect the community. Some of the questions and answers are as follows:

- **Question:** Can a vehicle in a roadway pass a bicycle travelling in the same direction while in a bicycle lane?

**Answer:** Yes, a bicycle lane is a lane of travel in itself. It is designated for the travel of bicycles. The goal of this new law is safety and to remember to only pass in a prudent fashion.

- **Question:** When can a vehicle pass a bicycle traveling in the same lane and same direction?

**Answer:** A vehicle can pass when they can safely maintain at least three feet from the bicycle or when the vehicle slows to a prudent speed and passes only when safe.

- **Question:** Does a bicycle have to travel in the bicycle lane if one is present?

**Answer:** Yes. California Vehicle Code 21208(a) states: "Whenever a bicycle lane has been established on a roadway pursuant to Section 21207, any person operating a bicycle upon the roadway at a speed less than the normal speed of traffic moving in the same direction at that time shall ride within the bicycle lane, except that the person may move out of the lane under any of the following situations:

1. When overtaking and passing another bicycle, vehicle, or pedestrian within the lane or about to enter the lane if the overtaking and passing cannot be done safely within the lane.
2. When preparing for a left turn at an intersection or into a private road or driveway.
3. When reasonably necessary to leave the bicycle lane to avoid debris or other hazardous conditions.
4. When approaching a place where a right turn is authorized.

- **Question:** Can a vehicle pass a bicycle in the 300-600 block of Bridgeway by entering into the middle lane?

**Answer:** No. This is a two way left hand turn lane. A vehicle shall not be driven in a designated two-way left-turn lane except when preparing for or making a left turn from or into a highway or when preparing for or making a U-turn when otherwise permitted by law, and shall not be driven in that lane for more than 200 feet while preparing for and making the turn or while preparing to merge into the adjacent lanes of travel. A left turn or U-turn shall not be made from any other lane where a two-way left-turn lane has been designated. This section shall not prohibit driving across a two-way left-turn lane.

- **Question:** What do the bicycle and arrow marks on the roadway mean?

**Answer:** These shared lane pavement markings are called "sharrows." Bicycle symbols are carefully placed to guide bicyclists to the best place to ride on the road, avoid car doors and remind drivers to share the road with cyclists. Unlike bicycle lanes, "sharrows" do not designate a particular part of the street for the exclusive use of bicyclists. They are simply a marking to guide bicyclists to the best place to ride and help motorists expect to see and share the lane with bicyclists.

## The War On Cigarette Butts

The Sausalito Sustainability Commission has made great progress in placing recycling trash bins downtown so that our residents and many visitors can more easily place their trash in bins that will send it to be properly composted and recycled, and to minimize additional landfill.

But there is one persistent environmental trash hazard that's been hard to stamp out: the lowly cigarette butt.

While these small bits of trash may seem benign, they are actually very toxic for the environment.

They are not biodegradable. They take years to degrade into smaller and smaller particles of plastic. And this material never disappears; it essentially becomes diluted in water or soil.

Cigarette butts contain toxic chemicals and heavy metals (tar, cadmium, lead arsenic and nicotine) which pollute our soil, water supply and wetlands. Butts are toxic to humans, pets, marine life and wildlife.

Currently in use downtown are large concrete ashtrays filled with sand. But they don't work well. In the rain, the butts float out onto the sidewalk and they are difficult to clean, apart from looking disgusting.

### A Better Solution

The Commission recently purchased four innovative disposal receptacles called "Bait Tanks." These eye-catching stainless steel tanks, with a shark fin on top, collect cigarette butts. The signage invites smokers to "Save some fish. Feed me butts."

Placing these "cute" receptacles in tourist coastal areas has helped Carmel, Monterey and Santa Cruz reduce their cigarette butt problems.

Two tanks have been installed at the Ferry Landing and two at Yee Tock Chee Park. Bay Cities Refuse Company will maintain them.

We hope the BaitTanks will be a successful solution to our butt problems, and if so, we will add more to our waterfront.

### Get Rid of E-Waste!

Residents and non-resident employees of Sausalito businesses can dispose of obsolete and toxic electronic equipment on Saturday, January 10, 2015 at City Hall parking lot between 9am and 2pm. The e-waste collection event provides an environmentally responsible method to dispose of unwanted electronics. This helps, for example, to keep toxic chemicals like chromium, mercury and arsenic, found in cell phones, out of public water supplies. Instead of going into a landfill, the electronics are processed by a professional e-waste processor, ECS Refining of Santa Clara.

Obsolete electronic equipment is shredded and mechanically separated into materials such as steel, aluminum, copper, and plastic. These are used in the manufacture of new products. E-waste is any electronic equipment that has reached its "end-of-life," or "end-of-usage," whether in working or non-working condition. It includes televisions, computers, computer monitors, flat-screens, laptops, printers, copiers, scanners, fax machines, servers, main frame units, networking equipment, systems, printed circuit boards, telephones and cell phones, stereos, DVD players and other consumer electronics. Please, no microwaves, lamps, batteries, or household appliances (coffee pots, hair dryers, etc.).

ECS Refining is certified as e-Stewards and a R2 Recycler, which means that the company is held to the highest environmental standards and prohibits the exporting of toxic materials to countries that have enacted laws making their import illegal.

There is no cost to residents or the City and ECS Refining will provide the staffing, packaging materials and transportation. This is the 5th annual Sausalito e-waste collection event.

The event is organized by the Sausalito Sustainability Commission and Bay Cities Refuse Services.

## Sausalito Village

Sausalito Village is dedicated to enhancing the ability of our members to live independently, remaining active and integral to our community as we age. Sausalito Village is operated by a volunteer board under the fiscal sponsorship of Community Initiatives, a California nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization, and is not affiliated with Marin Villages. A key element of membership in Sausalito Village is a dedicated telephone number that you can call to request assistance and referrals to the types of services and support you require. We call this our Concierge Service. Most of our referrals are to a dedicated team of more than approximately 65 direct service volunteers, all of whom have been thoroughly vetted and passed a background check. These volunteers are available to help with transportation, take a member grocery shopping, pick up prescriptions, run an occasional errand, assist with computers and other electronic equipment, and make friendly home visits or daily or weekly phone checks. At the request of a member, trained volunteers will do a safety assessment of the member’s home, make recommendations for modifications that can be taken to reduce risks, and refer the member to volunteer and/or paid service providers to accomplish these modifications. A health care advocacy group, consisting of volunteers with experience in some area of the health care field, will assist members in navigating their way through the increasingly complicated health care system to ensure that their individual needs are identified and appropriately addressed.

When the type of assistance needed by a member goes beyond what a volunteer can reasonably offer and requires the help of a paid professional, referrals will be made to service providers whose qualifications and references have been thoroughly checked or who are personally recommended by Sausalito Village members.

In addition to the Concierge Service, membership opens up the opportunity to become part of a vibrant community of people who share in many social, cultural, and recreational events. Sausalito Village organizes and provides transportation to many cultural programs and events in the San Francisco Bay Area.

There are also monthly member get-togethers, monthly meetings with guest speakers, a chair yoga class, a memoir group, a weekly bocce game, a book group, a monthly singalong, volunteer recognition events, holiday celebrations, and numerous other activities.

## Age Friendly Sausalito UPDATE!

In November of 2013, Sausalito's Age Friendly Task Force mailed and distributed a comprehensive survey to residents of Sausalito who were 55 and older. The goal of the questionnaire was to help provide a baseline assessment of the age friendliness of Sausalito by asking the people who would know the best - the seniors that call Sausalito home. We exceeded our goal by getting a 50% return on the surveys that were sent out, representing a great sample of our population that is 55 and older.

The 1200 responses from the Age Friendly Sausalito Survey that was mailed November 2013 have been tallied and analyzed and one of the most profound messages is that senior residents of Sausalito love living here! 91% of residents call Sausalito their 'home' community and a resounding 95% said that they are satisfied with Sausalito as a place to continue to live. Unsolicited, hundreds of additional comments emphasized the pride and gratefulness for living in such a beautiful area as well as many recommendations for creating an even more Friendly City.

The City of Sausalito's Age Friendly Task Force members carefully combed through every questionnaire response as well as the 3500 additional comments that were written in the comment boxes to ensure that every word written was captured in the data analysis.

### What priorities emerged?

The top priorities that emerged and will become part of an Age Friendly Sausalito strategic plan include:

Home modification assistance, Affordable senior rental housing, Shuttle like transportation throughout the City, Sidewalk repair, Safer crosswalks including lighting at intersections, Better emergency preparedness, Ease of walkability in commercial areas including signs, Meters, tables/chairs, Recycling cans brought to the curb, Business age-friendliness, Better age-friendly communication by City, Senior rate for City Parks/Recreation.

### What has happened so far?

We are happy to report that several of these priorities received an immediate response and changes are in the works:

- The City Parks and Recreation readily agreed to provide a senior rate for classes and now advertises all Sausalito Village and Edgewater Senior Club events that are open to non-members in the Sausalito Magazine.
- Age Friendly Sausalito has teamed up with Sausalito Village and The Sausalito Woman's Club to promote the R-U-OK? Program and the new Postal Carrier Alert Program targeted at isolated seniors.
- A small group has begun to create age friendlier materials that simplify the process for seniors considering a home modification project in Sausalito that will be available through the City.
- Age Friendly Sausalito is working with Leslie Klor of Episcopal Senior Homes to bring the Home Sharing Program to life in Sausalito as an answer to tapping into the already available affordable rental housing in our City.
- Age Friendly Sausalito publishes a Tip of the Month in the Sausalito Currents, many of which emerged from the comments in the questionnaire.



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
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
