

Sausalito Business Looking to the Future

Since January, six citizen volunteer committees have been working to develop their vision for a more vibrant Sausalito. Each committee was charged with looking at a topic area and developing ideas and recommendations for consideration by the community. The committees included Business Mix & Employment Opportunities; Maritime Support; Bicycle & Pedestrian Facilities; Buses, Boats & Piers; Telecommunications; and Cultural Heritage.

On Saturday, May 12, there will be a community meeting to learn what each of the six groups has developed for a vision. Following that meeting, a report will be made to the City Council about possible future action items that can bring those ideas to life.

Citizens' Police Academy

Once each year, the Sausalito Police Department puts on its very own Citizen's Police Academy. This Academy is designed to provide an inside look at how the department operates. Anyone who lives or works in the city of Sausalito is encouraged to participate. The classes focus on a host of topics such as: policing goals, use of force, drug recognition, DUI investigation, ethics, officer safety, and laws of arrest. Input and feedback is sought from the class on all topics. One of the classes is held at the Sausalito Fire Department, where the format is a question and answer period about the services they provide, along with a tour of their building/equipment. The City Manager and the Chief of Police also spend time during a session going over different topics involving the city and public safety issues.

All of the class participants are given the opportunity to go on two ride-alongs, one with a night shift officer and the other with a day shift officer. Not only do the participants get an inside look at how the department operates, but it is also a great way to get to know the police officers in your town on a more personal basis. The Police Department has gained some very dear friends through contacts made in the Academy.

"Participating in the Citizen's Academy gave me a real feel for what police officers do and the challenges they face on a daily basis. After the experience, it inspired me to initiate the Volunteers in Public Safety (VIPS) program in order to provide on-going support to the department," stated Chris Gallagher. Chris was one of the first citizens to go through the Citizen's Police Academy.

Titia Henneyman reflected back on her experience in the Academy. "I found the Citizens' Police Academy classes overall very informative and interesting. The funniest were two that stand out in my memory. The first one was when the request came for a classmate to show up drunk at the next class! At the next class she was picked up by the police from her home after having been given plenty of her favorite beer, which she had consumed all day prior to the class. In class we were shown how one can tell by the suspect's eye movement if the person is drunk. We were shown the different procedures the police use in determining that a person is drunk and thanks to the good sport, we had very informative hands-on performance. The second hilarious class was when we all went to the shooting range in San Rafael. For some reason the aim of the women was less accurate than that of the men, and all the male classmates would double over in mock agony whenever a woman raised the gun to the level of the heart, but shot well below the region."

Karin Williams, a long term Sausalito resident, participated in the Academy class and is now a very active member of the VIPS. She states, "The Sausalito Citizens' Police Academy provides the

opportunity to see first-hand the intensity and dedication which our police officers apply on our behalf, every hour, every day. To have a glimpse into their high-intensity, very demanding world for even a few weeks' time was awesome and inspiring, and truly a privilege. Sausalito citizens should "grab the brass ring" offered to them here. It's a win-win situation."

The Academy runs for eight consecutive Wednesdays from 7pm until 9:30pm. The class is open to people who live or work in Sausalito. Mid 2007 is the tentative start date. The Sausalito Historical Society, located on the upper level of City Hall, is open on Wednesday and Saturday from 10am to 2pm. Docents are available to assist with questions and research. No appointment is necessary.

The Ice House, located in downtown Sausalito, is operated by the Sausalito Historical Society. It is open Tuesday through Sunday, from 11:30am to 4pm. An historical exhibit created by historian Phil Frank is the main attraction. In addition, docents provide an invaluable community service by providing information to hundreds of visitors each week.

The Sausalito Historical Society was founded by Jack Tracy in 1975. During his tenure as Director of SHS, he wrote *Moments in Time*—a book that is required reading for those interested in Sausalito. In 2005, SHS recruited many local authors and editors to work on a new book about local history. Published by Arcadia Press as part of its "Images of America" series, *Sausalito* features dozens of rare historical photos. These books are available at the Ice House Visitor Center in downtown Sausalito.

Sausalito-Marín City Sanitary District Second Unit Amnesty Program

In cooperation with the Marin County Board of Supervisors, the Sausalito-Marín City Sanitary District is participating in the Second Unit Amnesty Program.

Between January 1, 2007 and December 31, 2007, owners of existing and new residential second units which do not have a permit to connect to the District's sewer system may apply for a sewer permit. Such permits will be subject to the normal permit requirements as described in District Ordinance 81, except that all applicable connection charges shall be reduced by fifty (50) per cent, and the owners will not be subject to back charges for the period of time leading up to their legal connection.

Legalization will help ensure that second units meet acceptable health and safety standards, thereby accomplishing the District's goal of providing safe and effective service.

Public Safety Facilities Project

The City Council hired Eric Glass Architects to work on the schematic and construction drawings for the public safety facilities project. Mr. Glass is also identifying ways to improve the functionality of the police and fire buildings floor plans and will soon be submitting those plans for City Council consideration prior to submitting to Community Development Department staff. Following review of the plans, it is anticipated that the project will have to be returned to the Planning Commission for approval of the proposed modifications. Once the plans are submitted, they will be displayed in the City Hall hallway next to the Community Development Department window.

New Faces in the Community Development Department

Persons visiting the Community Development Department will notice a few new faces among the familiar ones. Debra Lutske is the Planning Division's new Assistant Planner who started in mid January and was a former Planning Intern for the City of Atascadero. Debra replaced Aubrey Rose, who is now with the City of Oakland. The most recent addition to the Planning Division is Sierra Russell, who started in early February. Sierra is the Division's new Associate Planner and replaced Ben Noble. Sierra's past employers include the private consulting firm EDAW (San Francisco Office) and the City of Paso Robles.

Plan Check Review Improvements

The Building Division has made incremental improvements to the City's Plan Check process over the last year. These minor changes have allowed the Division to monitor its success and to gain understanding of additional changes that would help expedite the City's process. What we found is that one plan check consultant is insufficient to handle the quantity of building permits issued each month, which ranges between 70 to 80 permits. In order to address this situation, the Community Development Department has hired three additional plan check consultants who will facilitate the Division's plan checking needs. The Building Division now has four plan check consultants: the Phillips Group, CSG Consultants, Bureau Veritas and Coastland Engineers. Three of the consultants also offer expedited plan check services for an additional charge. Please call **289-4127** to contact Permit Technician Denis Brown-Bouvier for information on this process.

The Code Corner

DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITY. The Community Development Department attempts to inform the public of future development by sending out notices or posting a site on certain types of development projects. However, there are many situations where development occurs without proper City approval. The City's Code Enforcement efforts continue to focus on neighborhood concerns regarding questionable development activities and uses. All calls are confidential, and the City encourages individuals to contact the Community Development Department for confirmation of Building Permit issuance should they observe questionable development activity in their neighborhood. If the reporting party wishes to be contacted following City inspection, please leave your name and telephone number with City staff. The department phone number is **289-4112**.

SIGNS. Business owners are reminded to contact the Community Development Department should they wish to install signage for their business. You will learn that the City has development standards and design criteria that will help guide a sign that satisfies both your individuality and the City regulations. Business owners who install signs without proper permits will receive a Compliance Order to remove or get a permit for the sign. If the sign does not satisfy the City's regulations, the sign will not be allowed to be reinstalled. If the sign does satisfy the City's regulations, permit fees will be doubled pending an after-the-fact sign permit. Let the Community Development Department help guide your development activities in order to avoid code enforcement actions. We are here to help and to serve the public.

Teamwork Saves the Day for Hermandad— The Castillo Sculpture

The Sergio Castillo Sculpture project in Gabrielson Park is a fine example of what can be accomplished when City commissions combine forces and resources. In this instance, change was achieved by the Parks and Recreation and the Arts Commissions and a beloved 6000-lb.gorilla in the room!

After years of mired attempts by the City to deal with the sculpture's condition and dwarfed location amid dense trees in the Park, the Commissions teamed up to make a plan for the repairs, relocation, re-dedication and all associated costs. After all sorts of encounters with lions and tigers and bears plus advice from Sergio Castillo, the Commissions presented a joint recommendation to the City Council and received its blessings in late February 2007. Within hours, donation pledges totaling more than \$3000 were received as a great boost toward the \$15,000 goal!

Various fund campaigns will be held over the Spring and Summer months and, assuming the goal is met, the repair work will commence within public view during the late Summer. Visitors will be encouraged to for all to watch and photograph!

As a kick-off, the Arts Commission will proudly sponsor the opening Jazz & Blues by the Bay concert on May 25, 2007. Everyone is URGED to leave picnic baskets and wine at home and to take advantage of the scrumptious food and drinks promised by The Arts Commission. Every park-dining dollar will be applied to the Castillo Sculpture's repairs and new life at the entrance to Gabrielson Park.

This joint project is a labor of love, and all efforts are intended to exhibit Sausalito's commitment to both its arts and its parks. News from the Marin School

Spring has finally arrived, and at The Marin School, the warm weather signals a number of spring activities.

The mountain-biking group has started their after-school rides, and the photography club has several spring shoots scheduled around the Bay Area. Green Team students have begun turning the ground once again in the school's organic garden, and this year, the group is planning to expand the garden space to include a number of new vegetables and flowers.

We continue to explore a wide range of wonderful places through our curriculum-related field trip program. This spring, students travel to the Stanford Linear Accelerator, Muir Woods, the Academy of Science and SFMOMA for the Picasso exhibit, among other places. Zoology students will also visit the Humane Farming Association Headquarters as a part of their study of humane farming practices.

Planning For The 2007-2008 School Year

As a school district administrator you quickly learn that an important part of your job is to plan and prepare for the future. As we near the end of the 2006-2007 school year, we are busy readying our students, staff, faculty, parents, and facilities for the needs of the coming school year.

That new school year, beginning in late August, promises to be an exciting one. At the top of the list of anticipated events is the December 2007 opening of our new Kindergarten building. This Kindergarten wing of Bayside Elementary will replace a "temporary" facility that functioned for over forty years. When opened, this new facility will be a state-of-the art structure well suited to meet the needs of our youngest students for many decades to come.

At the same time, our progress on the Drake Avenue campus, where we are constructing our new middle school campus, will be well under way during this coming school year. We anticipate its opening during the following school year.

Both of these structures are part of the community's overwhelming support for the Measure I school construction bond. After many years of falling attendance, our District's enrollment is now on the rise. These new and expanded facilities will help us to meet future space needs.

Additionally, as we look forward to the Fall of 2007 I am excited that our innovative after school program has been fully funded and will continue to expand throughout this coming school year. Students who attend Bayside Elementary, Willow Creek Academy or Martin Luther King, Jr. Academy are all eligible to participate in these after school programs that are held both on and off-campus.

The programs begin at the conclusion of each school day and continue until 6:00 pm. As I have mentioned elsewhere, the funding that makes this program possible comes through California Prop 49, the After School Education and Safety Program Act of 2002, which increased statewide spending for after school funding by as much as \$550 million per year. Because of the approval of this statewide initiative, our students are able to attend all of these programs free of cost.

As you might imagine, our first priority for after school was to see that all of our programs offered opportunities for academic support and homework assistance. Students who succeed in their studies are well prepared each day to review their previous work assignments and then to move on to additional challenges.

I'm very pleased that the additional programs that we offer, from Berlitz Spanish Language Camp to the Sallie Ride Science Course, are offering all participating students afternoons filled with fun and challenging events.

Finally, remember that kindergarten registration for the new school year is taking place right now. We would love to have your family join us for a new and exciting year of learning.



Willow Creek Academy


Spring is such an exciting time at Willow Creek. We have been busy planting our garden and look forward to an early summer harvest of greens, flowers, carrots, cabbage and broccoli. Our herb garden is flourishing so we can try all kinds of flavors from basil to rosemary, mint to oregano. We are particularly proud of our heirloom strawberry patch, which survived the winter frosts and will soon be providing us with tiny little sweet berries. We have been doing work in the garden to tie our cultivating activities to the California state curriculum standards---the study of composting leads to geology and the nature of soil; the study of leafy green things prompts a discussion of photosynthesis; our frustration with frozen plants this winter has led to bigger weather studies and meteorology. But perhaps the greatest reward from working in our garden is that wonderful feeling of getting one's hands dirty, watching the snails and worms wiggle around and feel the sun on our backs. One does not get those sensory inputs from a video game or other stationary indoor activity.

We are currently enrolling kindergarteners for the 2007-08 school year and have a few places left. As a Charter School we can accept students from outside the 94965 zip code---many families choose Willow Creek because of our small, intimate atmosphere and the opportunity to have the entire family involved in their children's

education. Call us at **331-7530** for a visit and a school tour if you are interested. We also have some openings at higher grades.

The past several months have seen our classroom walls disappearing as many of our classes have pushed out into the community to augment their learning. Visits to the Aquarium of the Bay have provided classes with both lessons in Bay Area public transportation (ferries, buses and streetcars), lessons in Noh Theater experts from Tokyo resulted in many of our third graders participating in the San Francisco Cherry Festival Parade in April. Our Gardening Class visited the Hall of Flowers in Golden Gate Park, and our advanced art class spent some time at the DeYoung and SF Museum of Modern Art. Central to our belief in project based, inquiry driven instruction is a solid commitment to introducing our students to the great panoply of exciting and rewarding opportunities that surround them here in the Bay Area.

This planning process will engage and educate the community and further solidify support for the Library and its important place in the lives of Sausalito residents.

Versatility is the Talent of this “Gentle Giant!”

With great regularity, folks come to the Administration/Finance Department counter and ask to speak to “that really tall blonde guy”, and staff members immediately know they’re referring to Jeremy Holt. When Jeremy stands up from his desk to his full 6 foot-4 inch height, you know why they identify him by his stature. But in equal measure, folks comment on the patience and good humor that Jeremy displays when dealing with the public and his coworkers in the course of his tasks as Finance Systems Technician, which include billing for amounts due to the City, assisting with computer questions, and explaining business license requirements and City parking programs.
